#### APPLICATION TO AN BORD PLEANALA COMHAIRLE CONTAE FHINE GALL FINGAL COUNTY COUNCIL R132 CONNECTIVITY PROJECT

Fingal County Council hereby publishes this notice of its intention to carry out road alteration works along the R132 at Swords, Co. Dublin.

#### R132 CONNECTIVITY PROJECT

The proposed works are to be carried out along the existing R132 situated between Lissenhall Interchange and Pinnockhill junction, to the east of Swords Town Centre. The section of road the subject of the proposed development is approximately 2.6km long.

The works will involve the conversion of three existing intersections along the R132 (Estuary, Seatown and Malahide Road Roundabouts) to signalised intersections with 'at-grade' pedestrian and cyclist and Malahide Road Roundabouts) to signalised intersections with 'at-grade' pedestrian and cyclist crossing points; installation of signalised toucan crossings at three separate points along the R132; Pedestrian linkages to Chapel Lane and Ashley Avenue at the proposed Chapel Lane toucan crossing; Installation of turning areas at two separate points along the R132; Carriageway alterations including the establishment of designated 3m wide bus lanes and 2m wide cycleways and 2m wide pedestrian walkways along each side of the carriageway; Reconfiguration of the Drynam Road arm of the Malahide Road Roundabout to link directly to Malahide Road as a one-way road; Construction of new bus stops on Malahide Road: Installation of a sub-surface attenuation system: and landscaping and bus stops on Malahide Road; Installation of a sub-surface attenuation system; and landscaping and

Fingal County Council proposes to seek approval of An Bord Pleanála for the proposed works under Section 177AE (4)(a) of the Planning and Development Act 2000 (as inserted by Section 57 of the Planning and Development (Amendment) Act 2010). A Natura Impact Statement (NIS) has been prepared in respect of the proposed works. An Bord Pleanála may give approval to the application with or without conditions or may refuse the application for development.

# Non-jury trial on shooting in St Margaret's yard

Two Dublin men charged with trying to murder a man in St Margaret's, who has since died, have had the Books of Evidence served on them for attempted murder, the Special Criminal Court has heard.

Robert Redmond (32), of Woodview Close, Donaghmede, Dublin 13, and Bernard Fogarty (33), with an address at Cromcastle Court, Kilmore, Coolock, Dublin 5, are both charged with the attempted murder of Barry Wolverson at Madigans Yard, Kileek Lane, Swords, Co Dublin, on January 17, 2020.

Mr Wolverson died on February 21 of this year

after a lengthy spell in hospital.
Last Friday, Ms Maddie Grant BL, prosecuting, said that the Books of Evidence had been served on the two men, who were not required to be in court and that the trial was estimated to last up

Ms Grant said that a six-week adjournment was being requested due to matters being 'com-

spent so long a time in hospital' and a pathology eport was being prepared by Dr Heidi Okkers.

Mr Redmond and Mr Fogarty are also charged with assault causing harm to Gerard Wildman at Madigans Yard, Killeek Lane, Swords, Co Dublin on the same date.

The two accused men are further charged with possession of a firearm and ammunition to wit 38/.357 calibre bullets with intent to endanger life or cause serious injury on the same occasion.

The Director of Public Prosecutions (DPP) applied to the three-judge court on January 18 to make an order under Section 49 of the Offences Against the State Act that the defendants be tried before the Special Criminal Court.

In certain cases, the DPP can certify that in his or her opinion the ordinary courts are inadequate to secure the effective administration of justice.

Presiding judge Mr Justice Tony Hunt made the formal order on that date for the men's cases to be heard at the non-jury court.

### Universities to face strict rules in big overhaul of third-level

UNIVERSITIES are facing strict new rules on funding and governance as part of a major overhaul of legislation underpinning the third-level education sector.

Higher Education Minister Simon Harris is bringing legislation to Cabinet today which will see third-level institutions hit with significant financial penalties for breaching new State funding and governance

The move follows years of controversy over how universities have been spending taxpayers' money.

The legislation will put in place new requirements which State-funded third-level institutions will have meet to guarantee continued funding.

Mr Harris also plans to increase the powers of the Higher Education Authority to implement the new rules for universities.

The legislation will set clear conditions of funding for third-level institutions and the Higher Education Authority will have the power to impose financial penalties if institutions are found to have breached these rules.

The new bill will replace the current Higher Education Authority Act which is 50 years old.

In 1971, when it was first enacted, there were approximately 20,000 students in higher education; this has increased to more than 200,000 students in the present day.

When it was first established the Higher Education Authority was responsible for a small number of universities but that has since been extended

to include a number of more universities, new technological universities and institutes of technology.

Mr Harris will seek agreement from his Cabinet colleagues to publish the new legislation after this week.

The Cabinet will also sign off on a new Affordable Housing Bill which will introduce a number of new measures aimed at resolving the ongoing housing crisis.

Housing Minister Darragh O'Brien will bring the memo on the legislation which will include details of a new shared-equity scheme.

The scheme has been criticised by senior civil servants and the Central Bank.

The memo will also include details on how a new costrental scheme will work.

Meanwhile, Health Minister Stephen Donnelly will bring legislation on minimum unit pricing for alcohol.

The legislation will set a 10c minimum price per gram of alcohol and it is hoped it will affect only the cheapest drinks sold in off-licences and super-

This will mean a can of larger can be sold at no less than €1.32, while a bottle of Chardonnay will have a minimum price of €7.75. The lowest possible price for a bottle of gin or vodka will be €20.71. A date for commencing the legislation has yet to be decided.

However, Mr Donnelly is anxious to pass the legislation as soon as possible. There are concerns minimum pricing will drive people to the North to buy alcohol where there are no limits on prices.

Minimum unit pricing in Scotland has resulted in a drop in alcohol consumption.
